Participants can download the mobile pass by registering online at dauphincounty.gov/parks. At each site you will look for and enter the pin codes to win free prizes! Prizes include an assortment of things to foster and develop your favorite kid's curiosity for the natural world.

Step 1 - Get Your Pass

This mobile exclusive passport is a curated guide to Dauphin County parks!



Step 2 - Receive Text

Your passport will be instantly delivered to your phone via text and email and is ready to use immediately! There is no app to download. Your pass can be saved to your phone's home screen for easy one-tap access.



Step 3 - Redeem

When visiting a participating park, simply ensure your phone location services is turned on to check-in via GPS and count towards your prize!

#### Stream Stabilization Grant Award

We are delighted to announce Wildwood was awarded a second PA Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) grant in 2023 to tackle Paxton Creek Stream Stabilization. This project will continue to work on much needed bank stabilization and flood prevention measures in Paxton Creek within the Park. Most of the work will take place between the Paxton Creek Bridge and the two new boardwalk bridge sections. These measures, along with other stream improvement projects upstream, will help reduce the amount of sediment entering Wildwood Lake and stabilize stream channels.

The previous DEP grant focused on design and permitting for select dredging and restoration of Wildwood Lake. Completed in December of 2022, the project outlined a three phased restoration approach and launched the permitting process with various governing authorities like DEP and Army Corps of Engineers (USACE). We are excited to have part of Phase 1 funded with this Stream Stabilization project.

Restoration measures in Wildwood will increase flood protection while maintaining optimal recreation areas and diverse wildlife habitat. This will improve Wildwood Lake's flood control ability; restore shallow and deep-water wetlands with the ability to trap sediments and pollutants; and improve recreation, habitat and water quality to Paxton Creek, the Susquehanna River and the Chesapeake Bay.

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# A Word from the President

With 2023 almost in the rear-view mirror, it seems a good time to review the accomplishments of the Friends of Wildwood over the past year. An extraordinarily busy year has seen the completion of some urgently needed park improvements as well as the initiation of exciting new projects. It would take an entire newsletter to describe everything we've accomplished in 2023 so I'll stick to a summary of a few highlights.

There's no question that the Friends-assisted completion of a major repair and reconstruction of storm-damaged boardwalks was a highlight. Planning for this project was detailed and complicated, but when the funding came together, the project was completed and ready for its ribbon cutting at the end of April.

Also in April, the 2023 Art In The Wild installations opened for its summer exhibition. This annual regional art event draws thousands of visitors to Wildwood from April through September. Throughout the year, Friends' members and volunteers helped to support many other varied activities, special events and programs.

The Friends' Board of Directors continue to meet at regularly scheduled meetings to carry out its mission of "promoting the preservation, awareness, support and sensitive enhancement of Wildwood Park as a recreational area, an interactive environmental and educational center and a refuge for wildlife".

You've heard it before, but it's worth repeating. We could not do what we do without the help of our members. 2023 saw the increase of the Friends of Wildwood membership to 350 active members, a remarkable achievement in itself when the number in 1991 was just 27. We've come a long way and are looking forward to welcoming more new members in 2024 as well as exciting new projects/programs.

The Board of Directors of Wildwood and the endlessly dedicated Park Staff thank our supporting members and wish everyone happy holidays and a wonderful new year.

## NEW Friends of Wildwood Bonsai Workshop

## Wildwood Park 2023-A Year in Review

2023 was a big year for Wildwood Park, one might even go so far as to say it was one of our best. 2023 brought the following accomplishments: 190 public programs offered to the community, 42 guided school groups, the launching of a county-wide Parks Passport initiative attracting 1078 signups, 65+ pavilion and classroom rentals, over 115,000 park users (an increase of 40% over the last ten years), roughly 30,000 visitors to the Nature Center (the most since 2019) and the completion of several major park improvement projects including: the Wildwood Lake Restoration Design and Permitting Project, the completion of the Save The Boardwalk Campaign providing much needed bridge repairs, the acquisition of a Stream Stabilization Grant from DEP, the launching of a new Exhibit Hall Interpretative Master Plan, the addition of CAT bus stops along Industrial Road on bus route 9 and the installation of 3 security cameras in the parking lots.

Looking ahead, we are excited to continue to maintain our presence in the community offering vital green space, important wildlife habitats and diverse programming to a wide variety of individuals. Thank you all for participating in such a great year and supporting the educational mission of the Park.

## Run Wild for Wildwood Recap

On August 26, 2023 we hosted our annual Run Wild for Wildwood 5K/10K. We welcomed 250 runners and walkers, ages 12-83, for our largest race yet. Thank you to everyone who participated and supported this event! Next year's races will be held on August 24, 2024. Registration opens March 1. We hope to see you there!



## **Monarch Tagging**

Did you know Wildwood Park Naturalists tag monarch butterflies each summer? MonarchWatch of the University of Kansas has been providing members of the community with small, circular sticker tags since 1992. These sticker tags provide a glimpse into the migration journey of the monarch butterfly as they travel south, often taking them as far as Mexico!



Since 2002, Wildwood has tagged 773 monarch butterflies! This year alone we tagged 59. During our 2015 tagging season, a monarch raised inside the Nature Center was released on September 25, 2015 in Harrisburg, PA and was recovered over the winter of 2016 in El Rosario, Mexico. This small effort on our part is contributing to a greater community science research effort that you can participate in too. For a small fee, tags can be purchased each summer for schools, families and individuals to use. ## East Shore Trail Work Update

If you have walked the East Shore Trail recently you may have noticed some changes. This summer and fall we have had five experienced trail volunteers working on a variety of projects to improve this trail for park users. The largest projects were three sections of trail that were rerouted to avoid areas that are frequently muddy or overgrown. The group, led by Tom Scully, used available rock along the trail in the construction and moved some existing boardwalk bridges to make stream crossings. At the north end of this trail, stiltgrass and other plants were encroaching on the trail making it too narrow. The trail now takes you into the forest past some huge tulip poplar trees while maintaining windows to view the wetland. This group has donated over 95 hours of their time! Thank you guys for your hard work and dedication. Your efforts will leave a long-lasting impact on the Park.



#### Wildwood's Preserved Giants

Giants in Wildwood? It's true. Thanks to your ongoing support dollars, we were able to protect several very large



ash trees nearly a decade ago when emerald ash borer was first detected in the Park. Biannual trunk injections kept these large trees alive and healthy. Thanks to these treatments, visitors can enjoy the majestic towering canopy in spring and summer and the sight of ash seeds coating the trail in autumn. Two trees are easily located; one is adjacent to the Nature Center outdoor restroom and another is situated alongside the picnic area behind the Center.

Thank you members! Without your support, these types of projects would not be possible.

## Species Spotlight: Two-lined Salamander

Salamanders are some of the most elusive amphibians, which rely on moist environments to breathe and function. Several have been spotted along a freshwater spring on the East Shore Trail. This species is small and slender in size, anywhere from 2.5-4.75 inches in length. They are greenish to yellowish brown with a dark stripe on either side of their body starting at their eye and running till the tip of their tail. The stripe consists of a series of irregular black spots. These salamanders have well developed legs making them difficult to handle and spry enough to wiggle away. During the spring, females lay anywhere from 12-100 eggs on the underside of submerged rocks, logs or aquatic vegetation. When spring rolls around, check for these guys under piles of wet leaves nearby a fresh water source.



### The Olewine Nature Center Turns 25 in 2024

In 1999, the Olewine Nature Center was formally opened. Thanks to the generosity of Benjamin Olewine III and other donors, Wildwood Park complemented the public's outdoor experience with a facility for environmental education and appreciation. Since then, hundreds of thousands of visitors from across the region, as well as visitors from other states and countries, have learned from the exhibits, observed birds, shopped in the Nature Shop, attended workshops and seminars, enjoyed the arts and participated in family events and children's programming. ## Volunteer Spotlight: Carol Lopus

## Winter Lecture Series: Pennsylvania Natural Wonders

The Friends of Wildwood sponsored Winter Lecture Series is right around the corner. The lectures will be held in-person inside the Olewine Nature Center and do not require preregistration. They will be Tuesday evenings in January and February from 7:00 pm until 8:30 pm. This year's theme will highlight PA Natural Wonders including parks, waterways, natural areas and caves.

#### Tuesday, January 9

You may have visited one of Pennsylvania's 124 state parks, but have you experienced any of the state's 22 designated Natural Areas? From bogs to boulder fields, these Natural Areas are preserved due to unique scenic, geologic or ecological value. Join Marci Mowery, President of the Pennsylvania Parks and Forests Foundation, for an inperson lecture to learn more about these special places in the keystone state.

#### Tuesday, January 23

Within our state is one of the largest expanses of green between New York City and Chicago- the PA Wilds. Covering 2.1 million acres of public land, the Pennsylvania Wilds is known for its stargazing, elk, abundant wildlife and rich heritage. Join Meredith Hill, Director of Conservation Landscape Program and PA Wilds Conservation Landscape at DCNR, for an in-person lecture to learn more about this special place in the keystone state.

#### Tuesday, February 13

The Keystone state features over 85,000 miles of streams and rivers! From mountain streams to whitewater rivers, Pennsylvania has it all. Several waterways have even been designated as National Wild and Scenic Rivers. Join Vallie Edenbo, Rivers Program Specialist for the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, for an in-person lecture to learn more about these special places in the keystone state.

#### Tuesday, February 27

Pennsylvania is home to hundreds of caves - from short crawlways to miles of maze passages. PA caves provide a unique opportunity for exploration, recreation, surveying and scientific research. Learn about the distribution of caves in the state, how they form, how to safely go exploring and the unique ecosystems they provide from Rose-Anna Behr Senior Geologist Sinkhole and Karst Specialist with the PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources Bureau of Geological Survey.


