Friends of Wildwood Receive REI Cooperative Action Fund Grant

The Friends of Wildwood are pleased to report that a two-part \$20,000 grant has been received from the REI Cooperative Action Fund. Started in 1938 near Seattle, REI exists to inspire and equip everyone to get outside and enjoy the outdoors. Outdoor enthusiasts know that REI operates as a consumer co-operative and exists as the nation's largest retailer of outdoor recreation equipment.

The REI Cooperative Action Fund is a separate non-profit program, established as an arm of the REI Co-op in 2021. By awarding grants, the Fund supports other non-profits nationwide doing the essential work in making the outdoors more accessible and inclusive for everyone.

The FOWW was nominated for this grant by the REI Co-op Team of Mechanicsburg, PA in support of our mission and efforts at Wildwood. We are proud to be one of only six Fund Grant recipients in Pennsylvania this year.

We are grateful for and so appreciative of REI's recognition of The Friends of Wildwood. The details of exactly how the funds will be used at Wildwood are being developed, but as mandated by the terms of the funding, project work will be outdoors in the Park. We will summarize our use of the funding on the Wildwood website <www.explorewildwoodpark.org>. And you will also notice the addition of the REI logo on our website demonstrating our new partnership.

And that's what a co-op does: bring together people, organizations and missions.

Fall Tree Planting



Friends of Wildwood received a Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful Grant, funded by The Giant Company, for the planting of 29 large trees in Wildwood Park. We are happy to announce that all 29 of the trees have been planted!

Take a walk and you will likely notice Eastern Redbud planted along Wildwood Way Trail; Pagoda Dogwood and Swamp White Oak along the Towpath Trail; and Eastern Red Cedar planted near the South Lot to bolster the PennDOT approved Roadside Beautification planting between the Park and I-81 (started in 2012).

Trees were selected that thrive in Wildwood, are mostly native and are large enough to withstand deer browse. A winter cover area for wildlife was created along Wildwood Way Trail by grouping White Pine and Norway Spruce together – a recommendation from the Park’s Natural Resource Committee and referenced in the Master Plan. All the planting locations will help fill remaining canopy gaps. In addition to a visual screen, the trees will reduce highway noise, air pollution, runoff and curb erosion.

Nature Center Gardens

Special thanks to Mary Lundeen and Jim Allen for coordinating the October Volunteer Work Day. Together, with a handful of very hard working volunteers, they covered the gardens with cardboard, then piled mulch on top of it to help suppress weed growth. Special thank you to Hungry Hook Farm for donating the plants that were planted later in November.

Species Spotlight: Brant

Can you remember a time when spotting a Canada Goose was a rare treat? Countless members of our community can recall such an event. However, in the last few decades, the number of resident Canada Geese has drastically increased. So naturally, when you spot a gaggle of geese with a smaller version of themselves nestled in between, you take pause for a closer look. A Brant was spotted on Wildwood Lake this past November to the delight of birders alike. Brants are not baby Canada Geese but rather a different species entirely. Brants are considered rare for Pennsylvania and North America in general, making this sighting an added thrill! Brants look like a small dark goose with a white rump. Their head and neck are almost entirely black, with a small white "necklace" appearing almost invisible at a distance. In flight, these birds have a more pointed wing, appearing more angled in flight in comparison to the Canada Goose. They are fast fliers that tend to fly in an uneven "U-formation" or line. They are most commonly seen in southern parts of Canada. Their call is a soft gargling "rrot" or "cronk" which manifests in a low murmur, another staunch contrast to the Canada Goose. So, have you seen a Brant?

Volunteer Spotlight: Jill Buhrman

Jill's relationship with Wildwood Park began at a young age. She recalled her parents bringing her and her sister Jane to the Park to walk the trails early on. As a resident of Harrisburg, their proximity to the Park afforded the opportunity to visit regularly. As she matured, life took her in many directions due to work and family, which placed a gap in her visitation.

Jill has a bachelor's degree in Elementary Education. She worked for many years with Social Services in the Office of Aging for Dauphin County. She started as a Case Worker and then moved into Supervisor/Management before retiring. About ten years ago she started coming back to Wildwood on a regular basis and she has been counting the birds for Project FeederWatch for the past three years. She comes weekly beginning in November and ending in April to sit quietly at the bird feeders inside the Exhibit Hall to count the birds that stop by during that timeframe. Staff approached Jill and asked for her assistance with this project and she was delighted for the opportunity to contribute. She also counts the birds at her own home. She has the usual suet, black oil sunflower seeds and niger feeders. Her mealworm feeder is a favorite of the bluebirds.

It was Jill's mother who instilled within her a desire to birdwatch. She was a bit of a "bird nerd" herself whose enthusiasm spread to her girls. They would watch birds from their kitchen window where they could view their backyard feeders easily. They'd also birdwatch on their camping trips. Some of her life-birds have been seen at Wildwood Park including: pileated woodpecker seen from the Bird Viewing Area inside the Exhibit Hall, both the Ruby-Crowned and Golden-Crowned Kinglets and several warblers.

This volunteer role was a perfect fit for Jill. Her daily walks at Wildwood always involve some form of birdwatching. She enjoys walking all the trails at Wildwood, but particularly the North Boardwalk, especially on busy days. Jill also participates in a number of craft workshops at the Park. She enjoys wreath making, birdhouse gourd workshops, flower pressing, painting at the park and candle making. She recently participated in the Friends' Off the Beaten Path Bus Trip to Penn's Cave and Shaver's Creek. She expressed that these events are always a good time, one she enjoys sharing with her sister Jane. Jill thank you for your dedication to the birds and to Wildwood Park. Your smile always brightens up our day.

Litter Clean-Up!

Weekly Wellness Walks

Did you know Wildwood has an active Wellness Group that meets almost every week in a given calendar year?

Consider joining the group of like-minded individuals for a moderately-paced walk around Wildwood Lake. You can choose to walk with one of two groups. One group sets out along the Towpath Trail walking there and back, a 2 mile round trip. The second group walks the entire loop trail, a 3.1 mile round trip. Each walk is free of charge, however, registration is required in order to send out information on weather-related cancellations. Dogs are welcome as long as they are on a leash.
